### Fall Dinner and Road Cleanup Cancelled; Business Meeting and Elections to be via Zoom

Members, it does not look like the current COVID – 19 health and safety guidelines will allow us to hold our annual Fall Dinner as planned on October 24.

Therefore, your WRRRA board has made the decision to cancel the Fall Dinner event for this year.

While the previously cancelled Spring Dinner and Summer Picnic events are largely social in nature, the Fall Dinner is when our annual Business Meeting and Elections take place.

Therefore, while the dinner is cancelled, we will be proceeding with the business updates and elections, as scheduled, the evening of October 24.

We will hold these important sessions via Zoom video-conference (VC) rather than in person.

Please join us, to hear important business updates, and to vote on your new board.

We need good participation, from all tracts, in order to make the election results official (state guidelines require at least 10% of members vote).

For those familiar with Zoom VC technology, you only need to click on the link or enter the information into Zoom on your internet browser, at 7pm on Oct. 24.

The meeting will include updates from various board members or committee leaders, as appropriate, and then David Ebel will run the online elections.

If anyone would like to participate in the meeting, but is not familiar with the technology, we have also set up a “practice session”, a few days prior, to get comfortable with how everything works.

## Hunting for Evidence - 1958 Road Posts and Cabin Signs


Did you ever give any particular thought to the road and/or cabin signs in your tract? Or have road and cabin signs just always been there without WRRRA involvement? Maybe like you, I assumed the US FS only put up those small road number markers, so we knew one road from another. And then some cabin owners put up individualized signs in front of their cabins. To my sur-

prise WRRRA and the US FS actually worked together to plan a road sign project in 1958, that is memorialized in WRRRA archive records. The goal was to have standardized posts and signs that were to point to each cabin.

A notice was sent to members from the WRRRA Board of Directors after they voted to approve the proposal from the Committee on Road Signs on May 28, 1958. It explained the plan and included a drawing, as shown below. The US FS provided and erected the posts at intervals in all the road-sides of the several cabin tracts. The posts had a cross beam to hold a set of fastened-together cabin signs that had a pointed end, directing visitors toward the individual cabins.

The signs were made with uniform specifications and dimensions: 36 inches long by 4 inches wide and 1 inch thick. Cedar preferred.

The owner names were to be painted in 2-inch high block letters rendered in enamel paint using stencils and then protected with 2 coats of sealer. The Seattle Rubber Stamp Company sold the recommended stencil sets for \$1.25. Cabin signs could be ordered through WRRRA’s Secretary or the Road Sign Committee Chair for \$2.50. It was hoped that each turn off road would have a post to hold several individual signs dangling beneath the cross beam.



Do any of these decades old posts and signs exist today? The road-cabin signposts they so carefully planned are not familiar to me, a life-long cabin person. I cannot think of a single example of the originals and the drawing doesn’t match the signs around now. After reading this archive document I find that I am looking around to see if I can find even one. So, if you have any old photo of this kind of road post with signs hanging from it, will

you please donate a copy for the WRRRA Archive Collection? And, if you know of any road post and cabin signs like these from 1958 that are still up today, please telephone 425-822-2000 or email [diane@dwde Witt.me](mailto:diane@dwde Witt.me) so we know where it is to be found. 

## In Memoriam: Paul Rauch Meyer, 1936-2020

Paul Rauch Meyer (June 24, 1936-April 19, 2020), distinguished public servant as DSHS lobbyist, Executive Director of the Washington County Freeholders, Seattle/King County Ombudsman, and in retirement an arbitrator for FINRA (Financial Industry Regulatory Authority) with an additional 10 years as a consultant for small businesses, unexpectedly died at his Chelan cabin on April 19, 2020 of a Sudden Death Heart Attack. No warning! He was on his way the next day to Silver Springs 112 to buck up 2 logs he had just cut into rounds.

Paul's love was always of the out-of-doors. His childhood in Elma and Malone, Washington led



him to backpack and climb all of the Olympic peaks. And then 4 attempts with 2 summits on Mt. Rainier. Paul climbed all the major peaks in the Northwest.

He was an enthusiastic cross country skier still, in the Winter of 2020. Whether the Sun Valley, Alpental or Crystal area, he felt the call of the skis under his legs. He loved the feel of swish, swish, swish.

Paul was also an avid oarsman from his collegiate rowing days at the University of Washington. He rowed 3 times a week with the Ancient Mariners until Covid took them off the water last Spring. He rarely missed a turn out in all those years.

Beloved partner of Jody Nyquist, Paul joined in the restoration of Silver Springs 112 in the summer of 2011. Paul said it was always his father's intention to build a cabin in one of the WRRRA neighborhoods. His father used to drive them up from Malone to look at cabins and think about someday owning one. Paul said he felt like he was living his father's dream.

Paul became an enthusiastic member of the cabin community and served 2 terms on the WRRRA Board. He was instrumental in chairing and developing the structure of the Cabin Tours during that time. And he always flipped burgers at the Summer Picnic! Paul loved the WRRRA members, always saying they were "real people."

WRRRA President Kevin Orth wrote, "I very much enjoyed working with Paul on the board and at cabin events. I will miss his thoughtful and gentle approach to things."

Paul was an avid member of the Sierra Club, the Wilderness Society, the Nature Conservancy, and other organizations devoted to preserving the environment.

There will be a Memorial Service at Epiphany Church in Seattle at 1:00 on November 20, 2020 which will be live-streamed on YouTube. To join the service virtually, simply go to the Church's website which will have the link to observe the service.

## General Updates from the Forest Service

On June 25, 2020, Kevin Orth (President), Rena Irwin (Past President), Tim Curran (Vice President) Kevin Bannon (Treasurer) and Chris Masterson (Secretary) of WRRRA met with Martie Schramm (District Ranger) and Brian Lee (Permit Administrator) of the Forest Service, via Zoom videoconference call, to get updates and discuss issues. Here are notes and updates on some of the key topics.

### Goat Creek Culvert and Walking Bridge

Regarding the plan to replace the culvert, there is no change in status from what was previously reported: A replacement culvert has been identified and reserved for use, but the soonest a replacement could possibly take place would be next summer. The Forest Service is putting replacement costs into their budget for 2021.

Temporary signage for the walking bridge was created and installed by WRRRA members. The Forest Service team will follow up to install additional directional and official signage directing users across the walking bridge and up to the trailhead.

### Inspections Process

Brian is still working his way through the self-inspections that were returned by cabin owners. Brian will conduct inspections next year for any self-inspections not received.

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### Open Request Process and Cabin Improvement Projects

A reminder that the Open Request Process for submitting proposed cabin improvement projects for review is coming up (October 15 – November 15 for 2021 projects). Make sure to submit detailed plans including measurements, pictures, materials to be used, etc.

A few additional reminders:

- Septic Systems need Pierce County approval, but the Forest Service should also be kept in the loop on the perk test, design and implementation.
- Hazard Tree Removals, and Basic In-Kind Replacements, are NOT subject to the Open Request window.
- Metal Roofs Requests are also NOT subject to the Open Request window timing.

### Recreational Updates

Impediments to snowmobiles and ATVs were previously added at the gate on Corral Pass Road. Hopefully the road will open next summer; this summer there were insufficient resources due to Covid impacts. When the road does open, the area will be day use only.

### Forest Stewardship

All Forest Stewardship projects have been cancelled due to Covid. This includes volunteer trail maintenance events that were planned for National Trails Day and National Public Lands Day, and work on Corral Pass.

Future events will be scheduled annually with WRRRA participation on National Trails Day (June) and National Public Lands Day (October).

### Grants Applications (Road Work, Law Enforcement Supplement)

Kevin Bannon is going to work on getting grants for additional road work and supplemental law enforcement.

## Updates on Wildfires and Preparedness

Members, as you surely know, this has been another very challenging year for wildfires in the West.

At this writing, there have been tragic losses of nearly 150 cabins on Forest Service lands in California and Oregon, in addition to the impacts to suburban neighborhoods and homes.

For Washington state, so far we have largely been spared in our cabin communities, although a new fire was just reported the day of this writing near Stevens Pass on Highway 12, at Rimrock Lake, where there are Forest Service cabin tracts.

And as you well know, WRRRA members were unable to access our cabins for a time this summer, due to a wildfire near Mud Mountain Dam on Highway 410 outside Enumclaw.

It seems that the frequency and intensity of these wildfire events is increasing. Whether you believe this to be due to global climate change, forest management decisions, or a combination of these and/or other factors, I think I can safely say that we should all be concerned about this, and want to come together to focus on what we as a community can do to help mitigate this danger. Basic mitigation of wildfire danger has been discussed in detail in previous communications:

1. Pay your Fire Protection Contract to Pierce County Fire; help keep the Greenwater Fire Department strong and able to protect and support our cabin community.
2. Implement Firewise principles at your cabin; harden your cabin and lot against fire in case it comes, by maintaining the lot and structure.
3. Pay attention to burn bans and other restrictions on use of outdoor equipment. Be smart about campfires at all times.

The topic of Fire Preparation has been on all our minds since the Norse Peak Fire, but beyond the three points noted above, its difficult to know what we could do to better prepare.

I am sure this will be a topic of our WRRA Board Strategic Planning session coming up, and we will want to explore ideas for what we can do going forward.

If you have an interest in this, please let any board member know. We would love to have you join the committee that will be working on this!

## Snowplow Update – 20/21

Fall is certainly here this year. Seems like the calendar hit mid-September and the rains came. Consequently, it is time to begin preparing for snowy roads and driveways. With the forecast of a La Nina year, this could be a big snow year for us in the PNW. Fortunately, we have some snowplow funds in the bank from the last few years so the cost will be a little less than the last couple of years. We will be using the same operator as last year for SS, SC & GC, we are still looking for an operator for Deep Creek. If anybody has any operator ideas for Deep Creek, please either contact them to determine their interest in doing the job, and if interested let me know or reach out to me ([snowplow410@live.com](mailto:snowplow410@live.com)) right away, and I can make the call.

Marking: Every year we ask people to get their driveways marked early so the plow operators can identify the route. Make sure you are marking not only the driveway but also anything else to watch for (well heads, large rocks, stumps, etc.). Ideally, have marking at least 4 feet out of the ground. We have found that purchasing PVC pipe and painting it or wrapping it with something reflective works best. Remember - lots of plowing is done during the dark, so anything we can do to help visibility will be important.

Lastly, we need to make sure that branches and limbs are trimmed high enough for the operator to be able to get in the driveway without hitting a bunch of branches. In the past there have been driveways that the operator could not access to plow due to low hanging branches and trees. We will be trimming some branches this fall to help in this, as well. If you need assistance with trimming things, please don't hesitate to reach out. Cost: This year the amount we are collecting for plowing will be \$125 if paid by November 15th and \$175 if paid after November 15th and before December 15th. A road fee of \$75 is added to the plowing fee. Thus the charge will be \$200 before November 15th, and \$250 after November 15th. Cabins not paid by December 15th will not be plowed for the year. 
